## FELICITATIONS

Easter – what’s it all about?

I write this message on March 21, 2007, the first day of spring, after coming home from choir rehearsal where we have been practicing John Rutter’s *Requiem*. As a requiem, it is, literally, a musical composition to honor the dead. Death – requiem – Easter – spring – a strange combination. As such, a requiem is a *mourning* song and also a *morning* song – an aubade to the dawn of new possibility.

As we all know, this strange confluence is at the very heart of our Christian faith. Winter is the bridge to spring, and death is the bridge to new life – for Jesus and for us. Some of us believe that afterlife and heaven are literal, and we all will die to life on earth, only to reborn in heaven. Others of us protest that it is only figurative, noting that opportunities for change and growth only come as we loose ourselves from the bonds of limiting preconceptions. We can get bollixed up with arguments and protestations one way or the other, but the pure and simple fact is that we do not know and we cannot know until the time comes.

As we all know, this strange confluence is at the very heart of our Christian faith. Winter is the bridge to spring, and death is the bridge to new life – for Jesus and for us. Some of us believe that afterlife and heaven are literal, and we all will die to life on earth, only to reborn in heaven. Others of us protest that it is only figurative, noting that opportunities for change and growth only come as we loose ourselves from the bonds of limiting preconceptions. We can get bollixed up with arguments and protestations one way or the other, but the pure and simple fact is that we do not know and we cannot know until the time comes.

So the key question, it seems to me, is not what happens to us when we die, but how we live in the meanwhile. How do we live out Jesus’ admonition: “Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.”

For me – and many others at ACC – we recognize that character is more important than possessions and that the measure of a person is not what he *has* but what he *gives*. This was made so very clear during the benefit concert for Child Shelter International. As weeks of planning and busyness culminated in that one

grand event, I watched in awe as one person after another came forward to help. For me, all that effort was worth it when I received an e-mail from one of our new Prospect Sierra friends who thanked me and ACC and said that we had restored her faith in those folks who dedicate their lives to the church.

While the note was addressed to me, it surely applies to *all* of the big-hearted and hard working people at ACC. Please give yourselves a great big pat on the back, for you truly have been agents of Resurrection. For me, this is what Easter is about -- new life and new possibility right here and right now. Hallelujah!

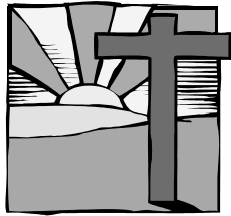

The website will also publish a free study guide to help viewers explore the meaning of Easter—using the TV program as the starting point for reflection. And beginning Easter Sunday, the UCC's virtual community at [i.UCC.org](http://i.UCC.org) (eye-dot-UCC) will host a discussion forum where viewers can discuss the special and their own feelings about Easter with the help of the study guide author, the Rev. David Holden, and one of the program's creators, the Rev. Cliff Aerie.

"Joy Dawned Again" was produced for the ABC-TV network by the United Church of Christ in partnership with the Interfaith Broadcasting Commission. It includes a welcoming message by UCC General Minister and President John Thomas honoring the UCC's 50 years of history.
